This year's retreat theme is TRANSFORMATION. It is a day-long event that invites all of us to reflect on the transformative nature of our lives. We will meet in groups, large



## FLOWER COMMUNION - Sunday, July 9, 11 am.

Rain or shine, this service will be held at the home of Penny and Roy Blake in Welland.

Please bring a lawn chair if you have one, and a snack to share after the service. Hats and sunscreen are recommended. Also, please bring a flower if possible. (We'll have extras, so don't worry if you forget.)



The flower communion was created by a Czech Unitarian minister, Norbert Čapek, in 1923. Each participant is invited to bring a flower, which will be put into a common vase. During the service each congregant takes a flower brought by someone else from the vase. Here is Rev. Čapek's explanation:

"We have chosen flowers, nature's most tender, common, and beautiful gift, as our symbol and sacrament. A flower is divine. You cannot create it whatever effort you make. [You] can create only a dead forgery without fragrance and life, nothing more."

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It's always a good time to read, especially works by local talent.

Giller Prize-winning author Dr. Vincent Lam is a noted emergency physician and Medical Director of the Coderix Medical Clinic in Toronto. Among his talents, he has written an eye-opener about real people struggling with opioid addiction and the interplay of the medical community that at times works at cross purposes. It sets out the nature of people 'hiding' and why hiding complicates the helping profession from gaining traction.

The dedication in "On the Ravine" aptly reads the book is "for those who are gone and those who carry on."

It's gritty, authentic and immersive. It states that it's fiction, yet it is obviously autobiographical.

"On the Ravine" (Knopf Canada, *2022) refers* to the Rosedale Valley ravine in Toronto. It's a familiar gathering place for the lost, needy and drug-addicted. It's a walk-along story following an Asian addictions doctor who visits the tent city on the side of a ravine, dispensing drug safety warnings, clean needles, naloxone and condoms. Addicts have worn a path just up the hill to upscale Rosedale. The surprising answer as to why that is awaits.

The book tells stories about the difficult treatment decisions that have to be made by an expert. Mixed in are back stories about big pharma and hedge fund sponsors looking for perfect drug trials to make their own big hit. A disgraced Rosedale doctor, who remains a good friend of Dr.Lam and who plays by different medical ethics, is also featured. The book considers the decisions addicts make to get high and how they deal with the lows. It's a daily grind of finding money to pay the street vendor.

What sets Dr.Lam's book apart is its precision. He offers a master class on how to engage gracefully and effectively with complex patients.
