I turned to the shelves at UCN for inspiration and came upon a booklet, *Read-ings for Common Worship,* from 40 years ago put together by the Unitarian Universalist Association. The invocation from one of its contributors, Bruce T. Marshall, set the right tone for me; a message worth sharing.

BEGINNING ANEW

At the edge of 2023, we pause. An artificial beginning to be sure, but still a time to reflect. A time to glance back at past joys and sorrows.

Reflect back to 2022 to some of the events of the year that affected each of us personally and collectively, as part of a Unitarian community and as a Global village.

First, think of the good things, our joys. What have we accomplished and what of those things are we proud? What were the special blessings of the year? Consider those things for which you are grateful. Of all these, what do you want to bring into 2023?

We can return to it from time to time to remind ourselves of our pursuits and blessings.

Take the paper with your concerns and sorrows and cast them away. Typically Unitarians burn the paper, symbolizing the release of all we don't want to carry forward. Emptying ourselves of the things which burden us can now be replenished with the spirit of good beginnings which fill us and cast a hopeful light upon the year ahead.

Every year is a weaving of joys and sorrows. Releasing the latter offers an invitation to our hearts to the possibility of growth.
