Let's All Celebrate ISLENDINGADAGURINN:

A Little-Known Unitarian Holiday

The recent CUC Conference was important, relevant, and very serious – except for one event, the Saturday evening comedy night. It was headlined by Liz James, a seminary dropout who founded the UU Hysterical Society devoted to "mirth and dignity." It is famous for its UU Hysterical Society Coffee Hour Facebook page – check it out!

Liz mentioned that in order to differentiate themselves from their American fellow students at theological school, she and some of her Canadian classmates introduced them to some Canadian Unitarian holidays, among them:

THORRABLÓT (Thor's Feast)

SUMARDAGURINN FYRSTI (First Day of Summer)

GAMLÁRSKVÖLD (Old Year's Eve)

and, of course,

ISLENDINGADAGURINN (Icelander's Day)

The translation of the last one sheds some light on things. In the late 19th century a number of Icelandic people settled in and around Winnipeg and brought their version of Unitarianism, derived from Lutheranism, with them. There's little to nothing about this strain of Unitarianism on the CUC website, so check out the website of the First UU Church of Winnipeg for the details. Naturally they brought with them some of their holidays. Those do survive on the official liturgical calendar on the CUC website, though you have to dig for them. Go there and search for "liturgical calendar." The first thing that appears is labelled "Confluence Lectures." Click on that and note that the first link that appears is "Canadian-Unitarian-Liturgical-Calendar." It's obviously out of place and will probably be removed as soon as someone at the CUC notices it. Meanwhile, enjoy! (I have downloaded the page and will send it to you if you ask nicely.)

ISLENDINGADAGURINN is celebrated on the first Monday of August, which we usually call Civic Holiday or something equally dull. I propose we adopt this name for the holiday and observe it in the traditional Unitarian way, which is to celebrate the settlement of Iceland in the ninth century.

THORRABLÓT looks like even more fun, but we will have to wait until January 21 next year to celebrate it.

President's Message . . .

The year 2021 will certainly be marked as a year of special challenges. Although the winter has been overcome by a glorious spring, the pandemic virus has not. We must continue to follow restrictions for our safety and the safety of others.

Similarly, our congregation has been an uplifting presence. I certainly am buoyed seeing so many at our Zoom services and listening to service messages.

Yet, at this moment we face special challenges. Membership and pledged income are down, but unfortunately, many costs are fixed, and stubbornly refuse to shrink. I think you can see by the analysis of our expenses provided by Liina Veer that we had significant imbalances. For one thing, the outlay on Administration was overtaking the budget for Programming. We needed to take action.

A task force from the board then looked diligently at ways to cut expenses and raise revenues. As you are aware, a special call has gone out to you to help us recoup the expenses we have incurred for the installation of a new furnace and ventilation system. The board believes it will help keep us much safer and warmer when we re-open. This has put another hole in our finances, especially as it falls on the heels of installing a new roof.

Other changes are also taking place. We have switched to another insurance firm and expect to save several hundreds with a different insurer. For many months we have done without an Order of Service, and we don't anticipate resuming this practice. We will be converting to digital distribution of newsletters, directories and AGM reports, which you can leave on-line or print. But, above all, we don't want to cut expenses in the things that make the UCN special, unique, and meaningful.

Sadly, we will have to say goodbye to Darcy Ewanchuk as our Newsletter and Publication Manager. Her hard work and expertise have always been timely and appreciated. We have found two volunteers to act as Publications Manager, Anita Miecznikowski and Mary-Lyn Hopper. I am very grateful these two have stepped up to the challenge. Their volunteer contributions will help us manage our expenses.

All is not doom and gloom. We still are strong in spirit. If we put our minds to it, I'm sure we can come out of this even stronger. We still have our Unitarian faith, and will be guided by its essential wisdom. And, most important, we have our community.

Newsletter total cost approx. \$230 per issue (billing for 10 hours) Five members and five friends receive mailed hard copies. Over 70 members and friends have had access to newsletter online.

Following discussion, our committee suggested that our newsletter and directory go digital. Members may print their own hard copies. For members without computers, arrangements can be made.

Social Action budget for 2021 is \$5500. To date \$2910 has been spent. The committee is asking the board to consider decreasing the amount taken from our budget and ask members or friends to make future contributions by "passing the hat" as we did for our Seniors Christmas hampers.

These proposals are up for discussion. We need to decide if we plan to budget a deficit indefinitely (i.e. until our reserves are gone) or make the necessary adjustments to keep UCN viable.
