

Marty Mako: Biography

Marty works as a Health Promoter for Niagara Region Public Health. He is dedicated to making Niagara a healthier place for everyone to live, learn, work and play. At home Marty tries to be a role model for his healthy message by staying active with his wife (and baby girl arriving in February), running marathons, reading, writing and volunteering.

Marty's community involvement started back in high school, when he was awarded the Rotary Medal from his graduating class for embodying Rotary's motto 'service above self'. More recently he received Rotary's Paul Harris Award, given to a local citizen in recognition of outstanding community service.

Marty has a passion for global citizenship, having volunteered in East Africa with Free the Children in rural Kenya, building schools, working with educators and mentoring local elementary school children.

He has also joined teams of volunteers from across Canada to support Habitat for Humanity, building homes for families in need in Santiago, Chile, Chiang Mai, Thailand and South Florida.

Using his health promotion skills Marty travelled to rural Honduras as part of a medical mission, teaching children the importance of hand washing and brushing their teeth.

Another summer he decided to stay in Canada, choosing to volunteer in our far north and work with aboriginal youth in the Northwest Territories. He designed and implemented a project called Photovoice, empowering high risk youth to explore their Yellowknife community from behind the lens of a camera. By focusing on their strengths and giving them a voice through photography, these young people learned that they can be the change in their communities.

But Marty also believes it is important to give where you live, and

volunteers locally with the United Way, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Out of the Cold, a guest Niagara Voices columnist for the St. Catharines Standard, and being an animal lover, walk dogs at the humane society.

If there is a consistent theme to Marty's volunteer work, both locally and globally, it is a dedication to improving the lives of children and youth, here in Niagara and around the world. He recognizes that our most at-risk youth need positive and inspiring role models in their lives, mentors who are willing to invest the time and energy needed to ensure they reach their full potential. Marty has had a number of positive mentors in his own life, and he feels it is now his turn to give back.
